AMERICAN UNIVERSITY TRANSCRIPTS

Official transcripts carry the date of issue, the signature of the University Registrar, and the seal of the university. When issued to the student, official transcripts carry the notation, "Issued Directly to Student."

CREDIT HOUR VALUE

All undergraduate and graduate courses are valued in credit (or semester) hours. Generally, each credit hour is equal to 50 minutes of class instruction per week.

From fall 1970 through summer 1978, undergraduate credit was measured in course units, with values ranging from a quarter course (equivalent to one semester hour) through a full course (4 semester hours). For example: C01.00= one full course or 4 semester hours. Undergraduate students who completed a 3-semester-hour graduate level course received one full course credit. Thirty-two course units were required for a bachelor's degree. An undergraduate student was full-time when enrolled for the equivalent of 3 or more full courses.

MINIMUM DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

Associate degree: A minimum of 60 credit hours
 Bachelor's degree: A minimum of 120 credit hours of approved course work.
 Master's degree: At least 30 credit hours of graduate work
 Doctoral degree: At least 72 hours of graduate work

FULL-TIME STATUS

Undergraduate full-time status is 12 to 17 hours in a semester. A graduate student is full-time when enrolled for at least 9 hours in a semester.

GRADING SYSTEM

Note: There is no official percentile equivalent for grades at American University.

Grades not calculated in the grade point average:

- I = Incomplete*
- IP = In progress
- L = Audit
- N = No grade reported or invalid grade
- P = Pass**
- W = Withdrawal (after first two weeks of semester)
- ZF = Fail on pass/fail option
- ZL = Administrative withdrawal from audit
- ZX = Fail (administrative penalty) on pass/fail option

***Incomplete:** Before fall 1980, an Incomplete could stand as a permanent grade.

Effective fall 1980, an Incomplete may no longer stand as a permanent grade. The Incomplete Contract between student and instructor includes a default grade specified by the instructor; this grade is recorded as the final grade should the student fail to submit the outstanding work by the end of the following semester.

****Pass:** Indicates a quality of performance no less than C for undergraduates or B for graduate students on a conventional grading scale.

Discontinued:

- R = Repeated course (follows the grade)
- S = Satisfactory
- U = Unsatisfactory
- WF = Withdrawal failing
- WP = Withdrawal passing
- Z = No grade reported (on pass/fail option)

GRADE POINT AVERAGE

Note: American University does not rank its students.

The grade point average (GPA) listed at the end of each semester is for that semester only. The cumulative grade point average is shown only when a degree has been granted. The cumulative grade point average does not include courses with grades other than A through F or courses covered by the Freshman Forgiveness Rule.* The graduate cumulative grade point average includes only graduate-level courses that are part of the specific graduate degree program.

To calculate the cumulative grade point average, divide the sum of the quality points by the sum of the semester hours:

$$\text{GPA} = \frac{\text{quality points}}{\text{semester hours}}$$

Between fall 1970 and fall 1978, transcripts include undergraduate courses taken under the course unit system. Total all the course units and multiply by four, and then add to the total number of semester hours:

$$\text{GPA} = \frac{\text{quality points}}{\text{semester hours} + \text{course units} \times 4 \text{ (fall 1970-fall 1978)}}$$

Before fall 1970, a 3-point grading scale was used. Also, all work attempted (as distinct from satisfactorily completed) was included in the calculation as "hours attempted." To combine the 3-point and 4-point systems, the following formula is used:

$$\text{GPA} = \frac{\text{quality points} + \text{hours attempted (3-point system)}}{\text{quality points (4-point system)} + \text{hours attempted (3-point system)} + \text{hours attempted (4-point system)}}$$

***Freshman Forgiveness:** A freshman who fails a course may repeat it within one year and have only the grade earned in the second attempt included in the grade point average. The first attempt remains part of the academic record.

■ COURSE NUMBERING SYSTEM

Each course is designated by a seven-digit number. The first two digits identify the teaching unit or department offering the course. The next three digits identify the specific course and its level:

xx.000-xx.009 = no credit earned toward a degree

xx.100-xx.499 = undergraduate courses

xx.500-xx.599 = graduate courses to which advanced undergraduates may be admitted

xx.600-xx.799 = graduate courses to which advanced undergraduates students usually are not admitted

The last two digits show the section number of the course. For summer courses, the section number also denotes the summer session.

The letters **C** or **O** before the first two digits indicates that the course was taught off campus. *Since fall 1992, study abroad courses have a course number prefix letter to indicate location.*

General Education and Honors Courses

Undergraduate courses may have a General Education Program designation following the course title.

Prior to fall 1989, letters were used to indicate distributive credit in Arts and Humanities (A), Social Sciences (S) or Natural Sciences (N).

Since fall 1989, General Education courses carry a Curricular Area (1 through 5) and a level (1 or 2) designation (for example, 1:2). Courses taken to meet General Education requirements are marked with "G" on the transcript.

Courses taken in the University Honors Program are marked with "H" or have "Honors" as part of the course title on the transcript.

Independent Study and Internship Courses

Each teaching unit may offer individual reading and study courses which are designated by the departmental course number prefix and course numbers xx.390, xx.490, xx.590, xx.690.

Starting in fall 1973, these courses have a second-line title which indicates the student's project. The instructor's name may also appear with the course title.

Internship (numbered xx.491 and xx.691) and Cooperative Education Field Experience (numbered xx.392 and xx.692) courses are also available from most departments.

The institution at which they were taken is identified by a two-letter code (shown above) after the course number. *Since fall 1973*, the institution is identified in the course title.

American University and Wesley Theological Seminary participate in a cooperative registration plan apart from the Consortium of Universities. *Before fall 1973*, courses taken under this plan are identified by "WT" following the course number. *Since fall 1973*, Wesley Theological Seminary is included in the course title.

At the top of each semester's record appear the semester of attendance, the school in which the student was enrolled, the student's major or major code, and the student's degree objective.
