Subject: Active Shooter Preparedness

We have all read the headlines and watched the news coverage. We have all been shocked and saddened by the senseless violence and loss of innocent lives. Columbine High School, 1999; Virginia Tech, 2007; Northern Illinois University, 2008; Sandy Hook Elementary School, 2012. This is just a partial list of educational institutions that have suffered active shooter incidents in the past few years. These events, as well as all too many others around the country, serve as poignant reminders that no one can be certain when or where such tragedies will occur.

An active shooter is an individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area. When we consider the randomness and unpredictability of active shooter incidents, we can approach the issue in one of two ways. We can assume it won't happen here and do nothing; or we can embrace the fact that preparedness and awareness are keys to helping protect our students, faculty, staff, visitors and ourselves should we have an active shooter on campus. Our responsibility to take reasonable and prudent precautions to protect the AU community tells us the latter approach is our recommended course of action.

To that end, President Neil Kerwin and his cabinet have endorsed providing all members of our community with a brief but effective video entitled *Run, Hide Fight: Surviving an Active Shooter Event.*This video provides guidance on how to respond should an active shooter situation occur. The video is presented in a frank and realistic manner with a singular focus: preparedness. While the scripted violence is simulated and mildly graphic, the message is real and will hopefully resonate across the campus.
