Ken Conca is a professor of International Relations at American University. His research and teaching focus on the politics and governance of water; global environmental governance; environment, conflict, and peacebuilding; and the UN system. His most recent book, An Unfinished Foundation: The United Nations and Global Environmental Governance, was published by Oxford University Press in 2015. He is also editor of the forthcoming Oxford Handbook of Water Politics and Policy. His book Governing Water (published by MIT Press) received the International Studies Association's Harold and Margaret Sprout Award for best book on international environmental affairs and the Chadwick Alger Prize for best book in the field of International Organization. Conca has received fellowships from the Fulbright Program, the Rockefeller Foundation, the Woodrow Wilson Center, and the National Socio-environmental Synthesis Center. He is a member of the UN Environment Programme's Expert Advisory Group on Conflict and Peacebuilding. Previously, he served on the Scientific Steering Committee on Global Environmental Change and Human Security for the International Human Dimensions Program on Global Environmental Change, and as a reviewer for the Fifth Assessment Report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, Conca earned his Ph.D. from the Energy and Resources Group at the University of California. Berkeley. He also holds a M.S. from the Nelson Institute for Environmental Studies at the University of Wisconsin and a B.S. in geological science from Brown University,
